Myrinda Schweitzer-Smith - received her Ph.D. from the University of Cincinnati and is a Sr. Research Associate and Deputy Director at the Corrections Institute in the School of Criminal Justice at University of Cincinnati. Dr. Schweitzer's research interests include the assessment of correctional programs, the science of implementation and knowledge transformation, and more generally correctional treatment and rehabilitation. She has co-authored several publications, presented nationally and internationally on correctional interventions, and served as a project director for over 300 projects. Specific topics of research and service include a state-wide correctional treatment program evaluation, the development and implementation of cognitive-behavioral programs for general delinquency, criminality, substance abuse, employment, and sexual offending, as well as recent initiatives to implement effective practices for community supervision and support. Most recently, she is responsible for overseeing several federally funded research and service projects to improve the treatment of justice involved individuals in the community.

He has been affiliated with Ohio CASA since 1996 serving as a board member, board treasurer, and chair of standards committee. Currently he serves on the attorney general's Linking Systems of Care for Ohio's Youth council where he chairs the state filed cases committee. He also serves on the Supreme Court's ChiPS committee (Children in need of Protective Service) and the Court Sup. R. 48 committee (GAL's). Doug is a graduate of Ohio State University.

Det. Sgt. Dave Daniels – is a Detective Sergeant with Norwalk Police Department. He has been employed by the Norwalk Police Department since November 2005.
